THE PURPOSE

The summit is for awareness creation, empowering (young people), action-taking trigger, impacts making, and provider of tools, resources and leadership strategies.

PARTICIPANTS

Regional students and other relevant people are brought together, encouraged and tipped to learn more as well as utilise their leadership skills, roles, and relationships particularly in their communities for better and meaningful ways of ultimately taking action(s) that address and solve their unique chal-lenges.

The participants will take part in forums that would result in actionable goal setting, an opportunity to share knowledge, and networking that focuses on building stronger Australia- regional engagements with the rest of the world particularly through celebrating Nelson Mandela legacy. As well, to develop the youth leadership regional plan, identify priority areas, do set specific target, and define strategies and policy measures that entails regional development.

THEME AND TOPICS

Our 2019 Theme of Nelson Mandela Regional Youth Leadership Summit Victoria, Australia is " Ethical Leadership and Commitment to Positive Change"

The summit's theme and topics are based on Nelson Mandela's legacy which are considered to be good for

- enhancing empowerments
- personal growth
- regional development and
- global engagements.

The topics will assist the participants, especially the youth to grow into key players and leaders in ad-dressing immediate and pressing challenges (Invoking critical initiatives and innovations).

• **'Celebrating Mandela's legacy:** lessons for the future' opportunities and challenges are in our region and how we as society can equip them with the capabilities to participate in the real economy in line with the legacy of Nelson Mandela. These are key great leadership and trans-formative principles from

Madiba's legacy. These stand out in a framework that addresses the world's social injustices.

- Challenges and Opportunities of Multiculturalism. Speaker will share the key facts or advice and demonstrate how his personal life and professional experience contribute to social cohe-sion in our region by developing skills for participation in society and extending understanding of different ways of living. This includes skills in communication for living, working and investing in a national and global context.
- **The optimistic Australian Leadership.** Speaker will engage the participants not only in the ru-diments of Leadership but what it takes to be effective in Leadership.
- Conflict Resolution. Aim is to develop conflict negotiation skills to allow
 participants the oppor-tunity to access mature decision making by building on
 their strengths and develop life skills, build resilience and hope for the future.
 This will help to develop both a sense of their personal role of who they are as a
 global citizen, in contributing to positive change. It helps students to know how
 to improve engagement between government, services and citizens, strengthens
 peace-building process.
- Investing in Education: Challenges and opportunities for a New Colombo Plan. Participants will discover contemporary insights in Foreign Affairs, with a special focus on Australia- Asia rela-tionship and how to achieve long term peace and stability in the region.
- Global Diplomacy challenges and opportunities. This is to give a balanced view on USA and Australia diplomacy as well as Asia Pacific. In that context, the speaker would demonstrate the challenges and opportunities in global diplomacy and how that contributes to social cohesion in society and extending understanding of different ways of living. This includes skills in communi-cation for living, working and investing in a national and global context.
- Understanding the importance of global competencies. An opportunity for positioning the re-gional young people in skills and intercultural capabilities through critical and creative thinking in order to develop knowledge and familiarity with Asia and Europe as one of their global op-portunities. The speaker will also talk about Goulburn Valley- Australia Belgium Exchange Program initiated by Future Voices, in collaboration with the Belgium Consulate, Victoria and how it is in line with the objectives of fostering Australia-Belgium bilateral diplomatic relations in the area of food industries, education, training, promotion innovation, social and cultural connection exchanges.

THE METHOD

The workshops are structured by key stakeholders and led by experts in their fields. The workshops provide highlights and key challenges, in addition to practical advices on the roles and processes while reflecting on the impacts and the roles the youth can play in taking actions and improving future out-comes. These workshops are designed not only to inform and educate, but to capture and highlight the voices of youths in Regional Australia. These sessions also represent a great opportunity to find po-tential collaborators who share the same challenges, goals, and aspirations. In this way, the delegates in collaboration with the experts are brought together to brainstorm for societal advancements.

RESULTS

Regional youths involvements is achieved and is expected to still provide multiple opportunities, part-nerships and ways forward, for example the forming of NGOs or private sector small initiatives, differ-ent learning platforms, creation of local projects based on the available resources. Also Alumni knowledge, peer networking, becoming certain industry leaders or agent(s) of the already existing ones including overseas one(s).

Initiatives for a global big picture for the City of Greater of Shepparton and neighbouring districts as a regional centre and for young people are also still a challenge.

Thus, one of the main goals of this summit through above mentioned organisations include: delivering new attitudes, value building, empowering and inspiring programs designed to enhance the foresaid and to overcome a number of barriers in regional development needs as mentioned above. In addi-tion, Future Voices has run and intends to expand into a larger centre, running programs founded on the collectively highly regarded 'Ubuntu' Philosophy as aligned with Nelson Mandela's legacy.
